The preparation

First of all, we did a lot of work in the villages around Nkhata Bay. We met a lot of people with ear- and hearing problems personally and invited them for Ear Camp. We have been doing this work starting from December 2015.

On the Friday before the Screening weekend Alex Ndipo drove around town and through the villages in a car with speakers and a microphone announcing about the coming weekend and reminding the people about their invitations to come to the hospital. Until late in the evening we heard the music and Alex's loud voice in the streets of Nkhata Bay.



On Wednesday 18th and Thursday 19th of May we drove to Dedza and Dowa to pick up the ENT Clinical Officers. After 2,5 years of experience in Malawi we decided not to take the risk to let them come to Nkhata Bay by public transport. The possibility would be there that they would arrive Monday morning.

All patients were registered at entering the ward and were handed a form on which the doctors wrote down their issues and treatments.

The doctors also gave the patients their medication which we had bought before. All treatment was free of charge.

After seeing the doctor, the patients came back to the desk to sign out and to make an appointment to follow up on their treatment. Bonifacius Ndovi helped us to translate all into Chitonga.

After that, there was the opportunity for all people to see doctor Ng'oma who is a dermatologist. He joined our programme to see if people needed treatment for skin diseases.



All patients received an appointment card on which we explained once more what earissue the doctor had found and what medication the patients needed to take at home.

Diagnose and Treatment





The ears were being examined with the use of an Otoscope.







Many patients were suffering from impacted ear wax or other dirt and objects in their ears. In case the doctors could not remove all debris immediately, the patients were given Deprox oil to soften the ear wax and were invited to come back the week after to syringe their ears.

The doctors also discovered a lot of infected ears and perforated eardrums. If possible, the patients received treatment on the spot. Others need to come back to have their hearing tested in June.



We also organized some awareness activities for the people waiting to be seen.

Volunteer Nina Kortekaas made flyers explaining what people should do and should not do to avoid damage to their ears





We invited a drama group from Mpamba to perform during the weekend. In their plays they attended the issue of stigmatising Deaf people in Malawian society.



The crowd really enjoyed the drama and hopefully it will contribute to the acceptation of Deaf people in Malawian daily life.







175 patients had made an appointment to come back in the weekend following the screening to have their ears syringed, or to see if their treatment was giving any results.

All doctors, nurses and volunteers that helped us out the first weekend, were present to assist us again in the Follow up weekend.





This weekend a lot of ear wax was removed from the patients' ears, which made it possible for them to hear clearly again

Many really, really happy people came to sign out with us!












Nina and Alex were Patient Attendants.
